










































- Diabetes
- Corticoid-associated Congestive Heart Failure in 29 Cats. Smith SA, et al.
 - 271 cats with CHF
 - 29 with steroid administration in previous 90 days (11%)
- VIN search
 - apx >30 cats with CHF after steroid administration

- 5. Cyclosporine






















































Levaluating Feline Pruritus

- Feline allergic Dermatitis
 - 70% flea allergic
 - 17% food allergic
 - Variable response to steroids
 - 13% atopic
 - Good response to steroids




LEvaluating Feline Pruritus


- Feline Food Allergy
 - Year round pruritus
 - Any of the 3 patterns
 - Variable response to steroids
 - 10-30% with concurrent GI symptoms
 - Common offending proteins
 - Dairy, fish, beef, pork, chicken, rabbit, horse, lamb, eggs, clams, "commercial diets"



















































"Mr. Boo"
